Clifford, whose early losses and poor choices led to prison time and who needed a new path, a new direction and new Hope.




James, a veteran who needed to re-learn trust in a system that failed him.

The Eugene Mission is a privately-funded, relationship-centered, sober recovery campus that partners with hurting people to rebuild the disconnections that led them to the street and give them the Hope, healing and resources to return to healthy community.

What does the Eugene Mission do?



Rescue Shelter

When guests first arrive at the Eugene Mission, they rest, stabilize and find support to begin a journey into sobriety and reconnection through our low-barrier shelter. After a period of up to 14 days, guests who are ready and able to commit to our programming take an exciting step into either the R³, or the faith-centered Life Change Relapse Prevention Program.



Dennis is a guest and rescue monitor who welcomes new arrivals and shares Hope through his own story.



David, a graduate of the R³ Program, spent decades trying to find stability until he connected with the Eugene Mission, built a savings and found housing.

R³ Program

Guests who choose to enter the R³ Program are assigned a Navigator, who acts as a guide and mentor, and begin the process of identifying the challenges that brought them here, while learning structure and stability through daily classes, life skills assignments and activities.

Men's and Women's Life Change Relapse Prevention Programs

The purpose of the Life Change Relapse Prevention Program is in its name. Participants come to experience deep transformation that is lived out in practical ways: They heal from addiction; they regain their self-respect; they learn how to repair and build loving relationships; they are prepared for a career; and they connect to a community of faith.
